## THE PROBLEM WITH "FOR":

"For" is about changing C\_\_\_\_\_.
"For" doesn't address the H\_\_\_\_\_ of the problem.
"For" requires actions or things, but not P\_\_\_\_\_.
"For" may never reveal who G\_\_\_\_\_ is.

"For" isn't the way G\_\_\_\_\_ relates to us.

## **BEING "WITH"**

For those seeking Jesus, the answer is "Come and S\_\_\_\_\_" (John 1:38-39, 45-46; 12:21). Jesus' true family are not those "standing outside" but those S\_\_\_\_\_\_ inside the house around him (Mark 1:31-35). The religious leaders were amazing at Peter & John, then they realized the source of their amazement: these men had been W\_\_\_\_\_\_ Jesus (Acts 4:13).

List places in Scripture where God promises to be "with" his people:

Life with God is all-inclusive: includes blessings, assurances, and service, but it is all about a R\_\_\_\_\_ with God.

## **BIBLE READING AS BEING "WITH"**

How can Bible Reading be a vehicle to be "with" God? Read P\_\_\_\_\_, E\_\_\_\_\_, & A\_\_\_\_\_.

Answers: From; Over; Under; For; With; Circumstances; Heart; Presence; God; God; See; Seated; With; Relationship; Prayerfully; Expectantly; Actively

"This is what God designs and desires in giving us the Bible to read. He would that we catch the spirit, rather than learn the doctrine, of this Holy Book.

There is a critical reading of the Bible...But a devotional and sanctifying reading of that sacred Book is different.

The man of God reads the Book of God to commune with God, '*to feel after him and find him*,' to feel his power and his divinity stirring within him; to have his soul fired, quickened, animated by the spirit of grace and truth. He reads the Bible to enjoy the God of the Bible; that the majesty, purity, excellency, and glory of its Author may overshadow him, inspire him, transform him, and new-create him in the image of God. The words of Jesus to such a one are spirit and life; they are light and joy; they are truth and peace. Such a one converses with God. His readings are heavenly musings. God speaks: he listens."
